Although PBMs negotiate with drugmakers to bring down the net cost of Rx drugs, manufacturers are ultimately responsible for setting the list prices of their products.

PBMs drive prices down by forcing manufacturers to compete with one another.




PBMs pass through to clients the significant majority of rebate dollars (90%) in commercial health programs
